tate Superintendent of Public Instruction Tony Thurmond announced that Chaparral Middle School is among the 293 exemplary middle and high schools selected as 2024 California Distinguished Schools.

The exceptional schools recognized this year are illustrative

of the persistence and promise of California's students, educators, and schools.

award "This a testament to the steadfast commitment, skilled work, thoughtful decisions that foster student learning each and every day," said Superintendent Dr. Robert Taylor.

"Congratulations to our shining educators, counselors, staff, students, and parents!"

Chaparral was previously recognized as a California Distinguished School in 1994 and 1998 and California Gold Ribbon School in 1995.

To select the state's highest award, the California



Department of Education uses multiple measures to identify eligible schools based on their performance on the state indicators as specified on the California School Dashboard.

The selection process involves a rigorous evaluation based on academic achievement, school climate, and efforts to address achievement gaps.

"It is my pleasure to honor and recognize these 293 secondary schools for their efforts to provide exemplary public education to all students," Thurmond said in the February 29 news release.

"Excellent middle schools and high schools play a critical role in the life outcomes of our young people," Thurmond said.

## **Walnut High Receives Green Ribbon School Award**

Walnut High School recently achieved a significant milestone by receiving a silver level California Green Ribbon School award from the California Department of Education. This recognition highlights the school's commitment to effective environmental education, reduced environmental impacts, and improved health and wellness within the school community. Led by sophomore Elise Chen and supported by Environmental Science Teacher Kathy May, Operations Manager Conchita Cawley, and Director of Maintenance Sam Sornoso, Walnut High School stood out among 41 schools nationwide at the award ceremony held at Claremont High School on April 30.

The school's efforts focused on multiple fronts, including rainwater utilization contribute to a more eco sustainable landscaping with drought-resistant plants like California lilac and Baja fairy duster. This not only beautifies the campus but also reduces water consumption and carbon emissions. Complementing these efforts, Walnut implemented a food composting system under Kathy May's guidance, turning food waste into organic fertilizers for school gardens. Additionally, water conservation measures such as low-flow fixtures, limited watering hours, and



friendly campus environment. The installation of solar panels in parking lots reflects the school's commitment to renewable energy solutions.

"Receiving the Green Ribbon Award is not for the recognition; more than that, it's about raising awareness for the green movement and fostering a culture of sustainable living," Chen said. "I am extremely grateful to get to be part

Ray McMullen's impact is now forever imprinted in Walnut Valley Unified School District history.

"He has mentored teachers and administrators throughout many, many districts and continues to do so," added Personnel Commission Chairperson Michael Cobarrubias.

"Ray always puts 'Kids First' and has based all of his decisions on doing what's right for kids," praised retired

Assistant Superintendent Dr. Nancy Hogg.

"Ray models what is the very best of humankind and he has blessed Walnut Valley and all of us with his years of vision and kindness!"

Ray took to the podium and recalled when his long tenure with the District began.

"Nancy and I could have never dreamed that night more than 70 years ago when I drove out to this remote edge of Los Angeles County and met with (Superintendent) Cy Morris and three board members to be interviewed for a teaching job," he said.

"Little did we realize this would become such a central part of our lives."

Ray was first hired to teach an 8th grade class at Suzanne Middle School in the rural K-8 Walnut School District where he also drove the school bus.

As he moved into administration, Ray was selected as the school's first principal and later served simultaneously as director of classified personnel and assistant superintendent in Human Resources.

"It has been and still is a great journey and I'm humbled, so very humbled, and thankful for today," he added. Maple Hill Gives Back

The world became a little smaller as educators from a rural village in Kenya visited Maple Hill Elementary on April 29. Maple Hill has pledged to support the Friends of Yimbo non-profit organization that is going to build a new library for the Muguna Primary School. The student CARE team hosted an assembly to share about the Maple Hill Gives Back Family Night held on Friday, May 17. During the assembly, the special guests from Kenya shared about their school and taught students how to say hello, goodbye, and sing a song in Swahili.

"I am so proud of our student CARE Team led by Mrs. Jodi Yim," said Principal Kim McNeil.

"This leadership group has put their hearts and souls into practicing altruism and bringing together two schools located across the world from one another. Today's assembly kicked off our fundraising efforts and we are excited to see how much we can raise to help build a library for the students at Muguna Primary School."

In total, Maple Hill's generous families donated over \$10,700 to support the building project.

During the three-week visit, the visiting Kenyan scholars, who were hosted by Friends of Yimbo and Dedicated to Learning, toured several Walnut Valley USD schools in the enriching cultural exchange program.

The District Education Center pathway between Lemon and Glenwick Avenues has officially been designated as "Ray McMullen Way." On March 20, District officials unveiled a new street sign and dedication plaque while paying tribute to the beloved retired administrator for over 70 years of unwavering dedication to students, staff, and schools.

"Ray, I can confidently say that our school district, our community, and thousands of people, including all of us here today, have been blessed by having you in our lives," lauded Superintendent Dr. Robert Taylor.

"Thank you for all you have done and congratulations!"

In addition, Ray's late wife Nancy was recognized for designing the Walnut tree logo in 1968 that is still proudly being used today.

Friends, family, colleagues, alumni, community members, and local officials gathered to mark the special occasion.

Ray, who is now 91-years-old, has faithfully served in Walnut Valley USD since 1954.

He is a friend, colleague, exemplary leader, mentor, historian, and volunteer.

## A Solar Eclipse Experience

Millions donned protective eyewear before gazing skyward during a rare solar eclipse on Monday, April 8. The sun and moon danced their way across the clear Southern California sky for more than two hours.

At Walnut Elementary, while teachers talked about what was happening and students watched a live stream of the total lunar eclipse in class, Elementary

Learning Specialist Jill Takayama pulled small groups outside to view "the real thing" with special viewing glasses.

At Castle Rock Elementary, students explored the different ways of viewing the magical phenomena using a colander, hands, paper dot shadow, and box cameras. "The moon was photo bombing the sun!" one youngster exclaimed during the celestial event. "It looked like the Cookie Monster took a bite out of the sun!" another child added.

About a dozen states were able to experience the rare "path of totality", in which the moon completely blocks the sun. Viewers in Southern California saw the moon take a roughly 50% bite out of the bright mass. The cosmic event was the last total solar eclipse that will be seen from the United States until 2044. Los Angeles will experience another partial solar eclipse in 2029, according to NASA.

# **Getting to Know District of Choice**

Parents, students, and school officials recently had the opportunity to share their experiences with the District of Choice (DOC) program.

alnut Valley USD Superintendent Dr. Robert V Taylor facilitated a webinar on April 19 with five participating districts hosted by Senator Josh Newman who recently introduced Senate Bill 897.

"The way I see it, DOC is the great equalizer," said Walnut High School parent Betsy Castellanos.

"It doesn't matter where you come from - you're received with open arms."

The resolute parent researched 35 local school districts before making the pivotal decision twelve years ago.

"Education is the key in our family and we found a really great fit in Walnut Valley!" she said.

Castellanos shared that although their home district is a good one, "it wasn't right for our daughter, Pitzil (Avila-Castellanos)," began attending Walnut Valley as a kindergartener and is now a Walnut High junior.

"We're looking at colleges now!" Castellanos said.

"And DOC made all of this possible!"

Participants also heard directly from students that have been able to attend school thanks to the program.

"The District of Choice program has opened countless doors for me," said Pitzil Avila-Castellanos, 16,

who has already been contacted by Harvard, Brown, and the Claremont Colleges.

"I push myself every day to be a better student and person because I know that I have been given an incredible opportunity."

The high-achieving teen shared that being a DOC student has required diligence from her family including a 30-minute commute each way to school.

Pitzil is involved in ASB, Project Lead the Way, track, computer science, and robotics - just to name a few.

"But, in turn, Walnut Valley has guided and molded me while providing so many rich experiences."

Parent Billy Fermin has two children, a 2nd grader and

6th grader, that attend Walnut Valley schools.

"District of Choice has played a huge part in their success both academically and as well-rounded individuals," he said.

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Fermin credits the DOC program for giving parents the autonomy to choose based on the right fit for their child.

"And that speaks volumes."

Fermin's son, Ethan, attends Suzanne Middle School.

"DOC allowed me to attend school with family, friends, and be surrounded by a good community with caring teachers and staff," the 12-year-old said during the webinar.

> "It has challenged me to do better, I've been exposed to the IB program, and joined leadership."

"I love DOC!" Ethan said.

The public school choice program allows students to enroll in other districts that open their borders.

Senate Bill 897 aims to eliminate the sunset date and program cap that doesn't account for current student population trends.

Of Walnut Valley's 14,000 student enrollment, 2,433 are District of Choice kids this year from 33 districts in Southern California.

"I think it's important to address some of the misinformation about DOC cherry-picking

students," Supt. Dr. Taylor said. "We do not (nor are we legally allowed to) 'pick and choose'."

"In the 11 years that I've been superintendent we've taken every single kindergartener through

12th grade student that has applied for District of Choice,"

"The late WVUSD Superintendent Dr. Ron Hockwalt was known for his "Kids First" philosophy across the state.

"He believed all parents should have access to educational opportunities for their kids regardless of what their address might happen to be," Supt. Dr. Taylor shared.

We haven't turned down a single one of them."

"One of the biggest reasons kids come to Walnut Valley is the outcomes," Dr. Taylor said.

"We believe our kids are prepared for life."
