

Bravo, Brahmas! Diamond Bar High School Receives National Recognition

Diamond Bar High School has been honored among the nation's best as a 2022 National Blue Ribbon School.

Principal Dr. Reuben Jones, U.S. Department of Education NBRSS Director Aba Kumi, Math Teacher Dena Lordi, State Supt. Tony Thurmond, WVUSD Supt. Dr. Robert Taylor.

A total of 297 schools across the country, with 29 in California, received this year's highest honor by the U.S. Department of Education.

"Walnut Valley USD takes great pride in announcing this exemplary mark of distinction!" shared Superintendent Dr. Robert Taylor.

"This coveted award is a testimony to the commitment Diamond Bar High educators have in meeting all of their students' academic, social, emotional and mental health needs, especially during the unprecedented challenges of the pandemic."

The Blue Ribbon Schools Program honors schools for challenging students to perform at high academic levels and for making significant progress in closing the achievement gap.

"Our theme this year is 'Raising the Bar' and I can't imagine a more powerful way to demonstrate our schoolwide theme than with receiving the National Blue Ribbon award!" said Principal Dr. Reuben Jones.

"I am so proud of our students and staff, both present and past, whose collective achievements have earned us this distinguished honor ... go Brahmas!"

Diamond Bar High School was formally recognized during an awards ceremony held in Washington DC on November 4.

California has the largest number of public school Blue Ribbon winners in the nation.

The roster of Walnut Valley USD National Blue Ribbon Schools also includes Quail Summit Elementary, Westhoff Elementary, Chaparral Middle School, and Walnut High School.

Ten-year-old twins Raiden and Kailani Reed were just about to begin a math test on multiplying and dividing fractions at Collegewood Elementary when they got the surprise of a lifetime.

After a six-month deployment, their dad, U.S. Army Captain Rodney Reed, returned with a grand gesture in their fifth-grade classroom.

A brown paper lunch sack was delivered to the children sitting side by side in the front row on September 26.

The minute they saw its contents - a raggedy pink and white stuffed dog - the tears began to flow. Puppy Dog, as they call it, had been on the mission in Jordan and Syria with their father.

The children immediately knew it was the signal that he was home.

"Dad!" Kailani shouted clutching the stuffed toy as he walked through the classroom door.

Raiden sprinted into his uniformed father's arms.

Captain Reed had carried that little stuffed toy, a gift from his children, in his IOTV bullet-proof vest throughout the tour.

"That's why he's all dirty," he reported to his daughter.

The adventurous dog had ridden in a Black Hawk helicopter and in MRAP armored convoys during the deployment.

"Puppy Dog was in the stuff when the bombs and rockets were going off," he shared.

"But we all survived!"



An hour later, the parents pulled off another surprise in son Hunter's orchestra class at Suzanne Middle School.

Music teacher Ami Garvin was directing students rehearsing a fitting patriotic song, "My Country Tis of Thee."

Seventh grader Hunter was in the back row with the other bass players and didn't notice his dad and mom, Wendi, enter through the back door.

The tears and hugs came seconds later and the 48 young musicians erupted in applause at the emotional family reunion.

And keeping in rhythmic tempo, students recited "Welcome Back, Captain Reed!"

"This is an opportunity for us to witness the love of a family and service - and to be a part of that was amazing!" Garvin shared.

"The best thing is that he's home and I can enjoy my time with him," Hunter said.

"I'm really happy!" said Kailani while standing outside her Collegewood classroom.

"I had always wanted him to do this, but I just didn't know when!"

"I'm so happy he's home - I didn't think we'd be seeing him for another week," said Raiden who was now grinning from ear to ear.

"It feels good to be home," Captain Reed shared after completing the second surprise mission.

The nationwide pool of approximately 16,000 semifinalists are the highest-scoring entrants in each state.

All semifinalists have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,200 National Merit Scholarship awards worth more than \$28 million to be awarded next spring.

Students entered the 68th annual National Merit Scholarship Program by taking the PSAT Test as juniors which served as the initial screen of program entrants.

To move onto the finalist round, students are judged based on a detailed scholarship application covering their academic record, leadership abilities, employment, participation in school and community activities, and honors and awards received.

Students must also write an essay and be recommended by a high school official. "This award means that my hard work finally paid off!" said Diamond Bar High senior Ryan Shin.

Ribbon Cutting Marks Completion of Diamond Bar High Science Building



Walnut Valley USD celebrated the modernized 500 Science Building at Diamond Bar High School during a ribbon-cutting ceremony on September 21.

The official unveiling marked the completion of the nearly \$14.3 million construction of the 38,790 square-foot building funded by voter support of Bond Measure WV passed in 2016.

"It's wonderful to see the learning that is happening in this new building," remarked Principal Dr. Reuben Jones.

"Measure WV allowed for this modernization and we're so grateful for that."

Parents, teachers, students, staff, community members, and local officials attended the grand opening that culminated with guided tours.

The new two-story building features 18 state-of-the-art chemistry, biology, and physics classrooms.

"I want to thank our community for their support of Measure WV," said Superintendent Dr. Robert Taylor.

"We wanted to have facilities to match our top-notch science program here at Diamond Bar High," he shared.

"I would say these are the best in the country and I'm really thrilled!"

The sprawling classrooms were designed to hold both lectures and labs with adjoining collaboration spaces located in the center of each floor.

"These new classes have more space, brighter wall color, and more of a laboratory setting – but most importantly they have windows!" said senior Zachary Asawesna.

"Now learning science is more fun than it already was!"

"Seeing the conversations taking place as students are up moving and doing experiments is amazing," commented instructional dean Jennifer Burns.

"And I can't wait to see more!"

Longtime science educators Jennifer Bravo, Teresa Hebert, and Eric Sorenson were part of the initial design meetings with architects.

"Science is fun to begin with, but now it's a lot of fun and I think that really helps with the learning," said Bravo who teaches biology.

The new 21st century classrooms have been outfitted with dual projectors, maker space workrooms, lab storage areas, and more.

"The added technology such as vacuum lines and fume hoods will allow us to offer a greater variety of labs to enhance student experiences in science," chemistry and physics teacher Hebert added.

For the past 19 years, biology teacher Sorenson was in his previous 975 square-foot retrofitted science class separated from other teachers.

"I was grateful and have a lot of good memories," he said.

"But, over here I have 1,400 square feet and now get to be with all my colleagues all under one roof!"

"It's like we died and went to heaven!" he added.

"In my 25 years as a high school teacher, these are the most modern high school laboratory classrooms in

the region," lauded chemistry and physics teacher Jose Marquez.

Biology teacher Kerry Iwanaga, who taught 29 years in the original "dark and dingy" classroom, echoed the excitement of his colleagues.

He noted the connected lab spaces and natural lighting as his favorite features in the "bright, white, and shiny" learning spaces.

"These new science classrooms feel so new and professional – it's like we're teaching on a college campus!"

Walnut High Nursing Pathway Offers Medical Career Preview



All eyes were on teacher Jennifer Carreno as she demonstrated a blood draw on a medical forearm during the fifth period Advanced Medical Assisting class.

Students wearing their blue scrubs eagerly gathered as she walked through the steps snugly wrapping a tourniquet, swabbing with alcohol, positioning intake vials, locating a vein, and finally using a venipuncture needle to simulate drawing blood. There was even a hanging bag of red plasma (water and food coloring) for the full effect.

Then it was the students' turn. The close-knit group applauded the first volunteer after he completed the detailed task.

These practical learning opportunities and experiences are helping Walnut High School students determine whether they have a passion to pursue a career in the medical field.

"Every minute of this pathway has been enjoyable," shared senior Camden Tsou.

"It's expanded my skill set and knowledge of the field that I want to go into."

Teens are learning to remove stitches, wrap wounds, and care for people when they are in need.

"And that's what drove me to the program," he added.

On October 17, students rotated through several clinical sessions including performing CPR, taking blood pressure, and probing IVs.

"This class is hands-on and I like learning the skills,"

shared junior Kiran Moritani who wants to become a nurse - just like her mother.

Senior Christian Juria, whose parents are both nurses, has already applied to nursing school for next year.

"I really like the content of these courses and everything about the medical field – the terminology, clinical tasks, and basic nursing procedures," he said.

The school's robust Career Technical Education (CTE) program is preparing young people for productive futures in a wide range of careers including early childhood education, architecture, business entrepreneurship, sports medicine, graphic design, and video production.

Over 150 students are currently enrolled in the Nursing Pathway which offers three sequenced courses: Health Careers, Nursing, and Medical Assisting.

Each day, Carreno, a licensed registered nurse, shows her students what a career in nursing looks like and that she truly loves her job.

"And if I can make them as passionate about healthcare as I am – that's my goal!"

Teams demonstrate good


sportsmanship working together to quickly solve and check the problems.
